PREPARING YOUR application

Here are some things to take note of in your application to NUS:

Select the correct level of modules:



- 1000 3000: Undergraduate modules
- 4000: Honours modules
- 5000 6000: Not open for to exchange students



Ensure that you meet the module prerequisites

We recommend that you indicate **8 modules** in your application, and include the course descriptions of modules that you are currently taking. Students who intend to take design-related modules must also include their portfolio in their application.



- Modules at typically worth 4 MCs each, translating to about 10 hours of preparation and class work each week
- 2. You must be registered in at least 12 MCs worth of modules before you will receive an acceptance letter
- 3. You can make modifications to your Study Plan after receiving your acceptance letter, during the add/drop exercise. Dates of the exercise will be regularly updated in the Registration Guide
- 4. You can only participate in the add/drop exercise after you've completed Registration Part 2.

Orientation & Registration

You are highly encouraged to attend Orientation and Registration, which usually happen 1 to 2 weeks before the start of the semester.



ORIENTATION

You will receive important information regarding your exchange at NUS (including making modifications to your study plans, student wellness and residential life) at Orientation.



REGISTRATION

You will complete the registration for your Student's Pass (student visa) on-campus at Registration.

Students who are unable to arrive on time for Registration please let us know the details of your arrival here: http://tiny.cc/NG-Late-Registration Registrar's Office will only provide this special arrangement to students with valid reasons.

Visa Matters (!)



All students will need to obtain a Student's Pass (Student Visa) to study at NUS. NUS Registrar's Office will email instructions on applying for your Student's Pass 1 to 2 weeks after you've received your acceptance letter. Students will collect their Student's Pass after arriving in Singapore, but will need to complete some online steps prior to arrival to ensure that the Student's Pass is issued smoothly.

Students who need a visa to enter Singapore can print the In-Principle Approval (IPA) letter via the SOLAR system. They can use this letter as a single-trip entry visa. All other students will enter on a tourist visa, and convert this visa to a Student's Pass during Registration. EXCHANGE IN A Crazy Rich City?

Although touted as one of the most expensive cities in the world, living in Singapore can be very affordable and comfortable. Here's a breakdown of expected **monthly** expenses (in Singapore dollars):

Accommodation	\$480 - \$850 (depending on room type)	\$600 - \$1,300		
Food (3 meals a day)	\$250 - \$500	\$400 - \$800		
Public Transport	\$100 - \$150	\$200 - \$300

Total	\$1,130 - \$2,000	\$1,500 - \$2,900

As oncampus accommodation at NUS is not guaranteed and in high demand, students should budget with the possibility of staying off-campus in their planning. Exchange students are **not allowed** to work or intern in Singapore while holding the Student's Pass.
