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## **Admission Requirements and Immigration Information**

### **Initial Online Application Documents**

After being nominated by their institution, students apply online using our digital application system. A .pdf guide with instructions will be provided at the start of each academic term. Students will submit the following initial documents:

- Copy of Passport- valid at least 6 months in the future from the time you enter the U.S.
- Statement of Interest
- TOELF or IELTS Proof of English Proficiency (if not a native English speaker)
- Transcript (minimum GPA = 3.0/4.0)
- Additional Questionnaires (English Language, Intended Field of Study)

We also advise students to start gathering **Proof of Funding in US dollars** as this document will be important after acceptance.

#### Language and Testing Requirements

#### Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)

Acceptable TOEFL scores for Rutgers schools are 560+ on the paper and pencil test or 85+ on the Internet-based test.

# International English Language Testing System (IELTS)

An IELTS score of 6.5 or higher on either the academic paper and pencil test or the academic computer-based test is acceptable for Rutgers University-New Brunswick

#### **Official University Documentation**

A certificate, diploma or transcript demonstrating academic success at an English-language school or an academic institution where English is the language of instruction

#### **NOMINATION DEADLINE**

February 1 (Fall and AY students) September 1 (Spring students)

#### **STUDENT APPLICATION DEADLINE**

March 1 (Fall and AY students) October 1 (Spring students)

#### **NOTIFICATION OF ADMISSION**

Usually two weeks after the deadline

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#### J-1 Visa process

Students are required to submit personal, family, and/or financial loans to prove they have sufficient funds for living expenses to support their stay. The DS-2019 (J-1 visa document) and supporting details are emailed and a hard copy of the DS-2019 is mailed abroad (at the student's own cost). Additional fees related to the visa will also need to be paid, including a <u>DHS SEVIS fee</u> and the cost of the <u>DS-160</u>. Most countries will require a personal interview at the U.S. consulate and wait times for these interviews will vary, depending on the location and time of year. 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## **Academic Information**

## **Course Selection and Scheduling**

Students must be able to demonstrate completion of all necessary pre-requisites to be enrolled in a course. This most often is evaluated based on successful completion on an academic transcript. Areas this is particularly important, but not limited to – Business, Mathematics, Statistics, Engineering, Computer Science, and all lab Sciences.

To ensure best chances of enrolment, students must have syllabi prepared with necessary prerequisites at the time they apply to study at Rutgers. Exchange students are enrolled at the end of the registration period, thus courses offered may not be open or available for registration once they are eligible.

Students should anticipate enrolling in a variety of courses during their time of study at Rutgers. A typical course load would be 2 to 3 courses in a student's major or intended area of study, with 2 to 3 courses that support a student's general studies or serve as degree requirements.

Students should NOT plan to take 4+ courses in their major, primary field of study, or single discipline. No course listed in the Schedule of Classes is guaranteed to be offered each semester, nor do we guarantee space/availability at the time of exchange student enrolment.

## \*\*Internships and Independent Studies

- Internships and Independent Study courses are only for Academic Year exchange students during the Spring semester.
- It is the **student's responsibility** to find an internship placement.

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## **University and Campus Information**

## Accomodations

On-campus Housing is **guaranteed** and **required**. Students coming to Rutgers must live on-campus. No exceptions will be made.

Students are usually housed in <u>University Center at</u> <u>Easton Avenue apartments</u>. In the university apartments, students will have access to shared kitchen facilities and be able to remain on campus during breaks and holidays.

## Health Insurance

All incoming exchange students are required to carry adequate health insurance. Rutgers University offers <u>health insurance</u> and will automatically bill you for this insurance, unless you show proof of other coverage that is equal to Rutgers insurance coverage. A guide to minimum insurance requirements at Rutgers can be found <u>here</u>, but students will not be considered exempt until their policy has been reviewed by Rutgers. Prior to arrival, students will have the opportunity to complete an Insurance Waiver form and to submit a copy of their current coverage.

## Disability Accomodations and Special Services

At Rutgers, students have access and are encouraged to use the Office of Disability Services if needed. The ODS team will work with each student individually in order to develop an effective and comprehensive plan for appropriate services and reasonable accommodations.

### INTERNATIONAL STUDENT ORIENTATION

**Orientation is a MANDATORY** part of the Rutgers University Exchange Program. Students are required to arrive on move-in day and attend the University / International Students and Scholar Services Orientation Program.

### Fall Semester 2024 (tentative dates)

- Move In: August 25 (Students should plan to arrive **and** be on campus by no later than 5:00pm)
- **MANDATORY** Orientation: August 26 August 28th
- Classes Begin: Tuesday, September 3
- Semester Ends: Monday, December 23

#### Spring Semester 2025 (tentative dates)

- Move In: January 19
- MANDATORY Orientation: January 20
- Classes Begin: Tuesday, January 21

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• Semester Ends: Wednesday, May 14

\*Note: Students are not permitted to enter the residence halls prior to the move in dates, nor stay past the end of the academic dates for each term.

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
