Studying in Galway

Each year, the University of Galway welcomes over 600 visiting students to study for a full academic year or a single semester.

As a visiting student, you can create your own individual study programme, based on the wide range of classes available from our regular degree programmes, to meet your own academic requirements.

Visiting students usually take between four and six classes per semester. Classes are generally delivered through lectures, which are also usually supplemented by smaller tutorials or seminar classes.

Visiting students are examined alongside our full-time degree-seeking students. Most classes are examined by end of semester examination, however many also include midterm assignments and/or continuous assessment.

We have many years of experience in credit transfer and course equivalence and can, on request, provide a suggested system to translate from ECTS credits to the credit system used in your home country.

"I chose Ireland because growing up I experienced American Irish culture, including the food and music, and learned about the history of Ireland but I had never actually been to Ireland itself. I wanted to take classes that would be fairly unique to this country. So, I went for modules in the Celtic civilization course and geography classes that would have field labs in an Irish setting. Highlights of courses in the College of Arts, Social Sciences and Celtic Studies are hearing the Irish language (no understanding is needed to succeed but it's nice to hear it used informally or references to Irish sources), doing outdoor labs on Irish beaches and parks, and having dedicated professors interested in Ireland past and present who share that with us."
